St Mary's Ten year Vision- New worship Centre- Report from the Building Committee

In November the Parish Council met with David and Jacqui Wagner from Atelier Wagner, appointed architects for our new worship centre. This is the first step of consultation and the beginning of design for our new worship centre. There will be many more to follow and once we have a preliminary design early in the new year, we will be seeking further input from all parish user groups and parishioners to ensure we have the design we need to enable another 150 years of worship in Sunbury.

This is a huge undertaking and we are doing this in the full knowledge that God's hands are upholding and supporting us as we progress his work of bringing his love and word to all in Sunbury and surrounding districts. We have the support of the Diocese and will need to satisfy design and funding requirements in order to complete this project.

In addition the Hume City Council and our local councilors have been consulted and engaged providing in principal support for this project. There is much to do in 2016 and we do so with much prayer of which we ask your continual on-going support.

Next year once we have an approved design we plan to relaunch the building fund with a focus on seeking commitments for funding this new step of faith. We acknowledge and thank all who have continued to support the building fund through direct giving and the envelope system and can assure you that these funds are being allocated towards our future building.

It is an exciting time to be a part of St Mary's as we fulfill our commitment of loving Jesus and sharing God's love with all.

Refugees Weekend

Kim Beales writes for us about the Refugee weekend that occurred in November, and its ongoing impact

On Saturday 28th November, a group of 20 refugees travelled from Dandenong to Sunbury to spend the weekend with us. Our guests were connected through Pioneers' language centre in Dandenong, and came from Afghanistan, Iran, Pakistan, Egypt, and Malaysia. The purpose of the weekend was to enable people from St Mary's and St Andrew's a context in which to meet a refugee or asylum seeker, and to extend hospitality and a warm welcome to them. Around 15 homes were opened, and it was a wonderful experience not only for the hosts and our guests, but also for the church and wider community.

A highlight for me was the initial greeting at Southern Cross. The Dandenong and Sunbury trains connected perfectly, and there was a great sense of excitement as we met at the platform and headed off together for Sunbury. A number of hosts had gathered to greet us at Sunbury station. We then shared morning tea together in the St Mary's hall. It was an opportunity for hosts to meet their quests, who were each given a welcome pack with information about Sunbury, and stationery. We then headed off for a picnic at hanging rock. A number of guests marveled at the views and the open space, and throughout the weekend our guests expressed immense gratitude for the welcome they received.



On Saturday night, over 200 people filled the memorial hall for the bushdance. There was music, dancing, conversation, festivity, and an amazing banquet of delicious curries and casseroles. It was a great night of celebration, and many people were contributing behind the scenes, cooking and serving meals, setting up tables, and engaging in conversation. Many of our guests have been separated from their families for years. One of our guests who daily experiences great concern and longing for his family back in Afghanistan, described a feeling of forgetfulness that night, just for a time, as he found himself caught up in the joy of the occasion.

"When you are running for your life there are no borders... you just run."



Together with the heights of celebration, there were some poignant moments. On Sunday morning we were privileged to hear from two of our guests, one from Iran and the other from Afghanistan. A young Afghan girl spoke very powerfully at St Andrew's and St Mary's, and many shared her tears. She said,

"We don't need your sympathy... we need your empathy. We need you to put yourselves in our shoes... If your family is under threat of being killed everyday, would you wait in some so-called queue? No you would grab your children, grab your husband, grab your wife and you would flee. When you are running for your life there are no borders... you just run."

Reflections

A group recently met to share stories about the weekend. We heard a wonderful story from Hilary Williams. Her guest from Afghanistan had expressed that despite being given permission to work, she was finding it very difficult to get a job. Having listened to her, Hilary asked her whether she might be able to do a practical task such as ironing, and put out a notice in her community. A week later, Hilary received a beautiful text message. She had discussed the idea with her case-worker, and now had a job at a dry cleaners, working with an iron press. She showed great appreciation and thanks at having received the suggestion.

This story reminded me of the significance of friendship and conversation. Opportunity emerges in the context of relationship, and our speech matters immensely. What we speak about is able to transform reality. When we dream up ways of showing welcome and kindness, and when we converse with people, new realities come into being. Perhaps the weekend will generate a new kind of speech, not merely driven by media or political concerns, but emerging from first hand experience and the exchange of real stories. Jesus taught us that by faith, we can throw mountains into the sea. Whatever the complexity of the world's refugee crisis, we have a contribution to make here in Sunbury, as we pray and act in faith.

Already many people have expressed a desire to do a weekend like this again. My own sense is that the next step for us as a church is to be intentional about hospitality on a smaller level. A few ideas emerged as we shared stories at our debrief session. Perhaps a number of people could open their homes for a simple meal, or perhaps we could meet our guests again for a picnic at the botanical gardens. Over a period of years it would be wonderful if we can develop friendships with refugees who live in our region, so that refugees and those seeking asylum are a part of our life together.

Before departing, one of our guests, who had stayed with Gavin, thanked him for his hospitality. He thanked Gavin, the church, and he thanked Jesus. Surely the love of Christ was shown in a beautiful way throughout this weekend, and for this we can give thanks.

Looking Ahead to 2016

Gavin gives us a sneak peak at what we can look forward to in 2016 at St Mary's.

There is much to look forward to in 2016 with the prospects of a new staff member joining us in March and the next steps in very early design proposals for our new building. In addition we have some great preaching series planned including:-

- Listening to Jesus' words during Lent from the Sermon on the Mount;
- A visit by Celebrate Messiah on Easter Day;
- A look through the early chapters of Romans;
- Looking back at some famous Sunday School Stories from the Old Testament;
- Examining what worship really is (in all aspects of life);
- A look at the book of Revelation;
- A study of the Lord's Prayer; and
- A look at the Second Coming of Jesus during Advent.

In addition, we will be reviewing our engagement with refugees and determine what our next steps will be. We also plan to highlight Domestic Violence at our services around White Ribbon day in November.

We have other activities planned associated with strengthening marriages and parenting, evangelism training together with some creative evangelistic activities through our Mission Action Teams. We are also planning further Ridley Certificate Subjects for those interested in deepening their understanding of the Bible and Theology.

My thanks to everyone who has made a commitment towards the new staff member. I will keep you all updated on our progress to employ someone. Please continue to pray for the Wardens and I, that God will lead us to the person of His choosing for us.

We will also be welcoming Matthew Browne to our team in 2016 as a Ridley Student. Matt, together with his wife Erin, will be worshipping and serving God under Kim's leadership, chiefly at our 5pm congregation.

The Chibobo Mission Team for 2016 is slowly taking shape with confirmed members being: Annette and Kevin Swaffield, Emily Clements, Wendy Caramarco, Kirsteen McCullough, Stephen Smith, Megan Riley and myself.
