There has certainly been quite a reaction to it. Social media and the general media have expressed many views from "it was too long" and "what was he talking about?" to "how great was that"?

Of particular interest to me has been the response from the Christian community worldwide to the sermon. Some articles I have read have been very critical of the sermon because, while it focussed on love, it didn't specifically highlight the expression of God's love for all through Jesus' suffering death and resurrection for each of us because of our sin. In other words, some have criticised it as lacking the full gospel message. At some level that is a fair criticism as we should always try to speak of the gospel on all occasions.

Others articles have expressed that the same criticisms could be made of Jesus himself at the wedding in Cana (John 2:1-11) where he merely changed water into wine (as his first miracle); giving an early glimpse of who he was rather than spelling out who specifically he was (the Messiah) and a call for people to follow him. That is also a fair comment.

Whichever view you take, I thought his sermon was appropriate for the occasion (a wedding). It didn't contain the full gospel message but I thought was a great advertisement for God's love and for an engaging gospel, broadcast to the World, amidst the pain many have suffered through the church. We pray God's Holy Spirit works through the message and into the hearts of enquiring minds. Well done Bishop Curry!

Baptism, Confirmation and Reception into Anglican Communion

On 29 July at our 5pm service we'll be conducting a service of Confirmation, which can also include Baptism and Reception into the Anglican Communion. What do all these terms mean?

Well, let me start with Baptism. Jesus said to his disciples in Matthew 28 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you." So as someone accepts Jesus as Saviour, we baptise them and they become members of God's kingdom and church. In the Anglican Church we also baptise infants, based on the faith of their parents. These infants are baptised into the covenant promises of God, much the same as Jewish children were circumcised into the covenant.

However, as infants who are baptised don't remember their baptism (like me), they must confirm their faith when they are in a position to do so. In other words, it's important they make a public proclamation of their faith in Jesus. In the Anglican church this is Confirmation and the Bishop (representing the wider church) confirms the person by laying hands on them and asking for God's blessing on them.

Some Christians are baptised in other denominations and we as the Anglican Church recognise that baptism. However, in order for the person to hold a position in the Anglican Church (including on Parish Council) or to work in an Ordained capacity and in other ways they must become a member of the Anglican Church and this in known as Reception into the Anglican Communion. Once again the Bishop lays hands on them and prays for them.

Christianity Explored

We all get one life to live. Deep down we're all asking the same question--what's it all about? Christianity Explored is a 5-week program that digs deep into life's most important questions, the Christian faith and what it really means to live an authentic life. This program is primarily for two audiences. Firstly, this course will serve as preparation for those seeking baptism and confirmation.

Secondly, this course will encourage those who are seeking to explore life's biggest question and the Christian faith. There are no strings or obligations attached. Bring a friend and come explore with us.


We will also be helping to complete a new cooking kitchen at the HMP orphanage.

Building Committee Update Phil Stacy, Alan Phillips, Ben Clements, Noel Sprague

The Building Committee give thanks to God for the planning approval received from the Hume City Council. We wish to thank all parishioners who have supported us through prayer over the application period. As a side note our architect informed us last week that a similar application from another church is still waiting on a response from another council.

I am reminded of Paul Whitakers words to us "No prayer, No Power, Some prayer, Some power, MUCH prayer MUCH power" The Building Committee cannot thank parishioners enough for your prayerful support over the past 8 months. So much more will be required once we reaffirm God's plans for our future.

The planning approval contained several conditions; the following summarises those that impact upon us and those we are responding to within 60 days.

- 1) Fencing to site frontage there will be none
- Bollard lighting: we are concerned bollard lighting would be knocked over/damaged and propose in lieu to place lighting in the tree canopies as a continuation of the Council's installation of lighting into the tree canopies in O'Shanassy Street.
- 3) Sealed car park: the Building Committee and Hume Senior planner, as per our January 2017 meeting, indicated a preference for a permeable surface without kerb and channels to maintain the village green feel. We are happy for the area to be stabilised with subsurface permeable reinforcing system.
- 4) Location of waste storage, architect will respond with this.
- 5) Landscaping: We will be seeking parishioner input to develop the landscaping plan for submission.

- 6) Operating Hours our architect explained that the planning report did not propose any specific opening hours nor did Hume CC enquire regarding this, indeed our architect requested that any site specific conditions should be run past them before being included in the permit (which did not happen). We understand that the opening hours within the permit were based upon traffic engineering framework of times in the car park assessments. David Wagner has spoken with Hume CC case Planning Officer Henry Dong regarding the hours and Henry advised that we should write in response with proposed hours. We have advised the following:
 - Office 9am to 5pm
 - Morning start can be 7am
 - Midnight Christmas service
 - Parties, music stopped by 11pm, out by 12 midnight.
 - Easter Dawn service In conclusion, request for 7am to 12 midnight 7 days a week plus extended hours.

The Building Committee has requested a special Parish Council meeting for June 18 to pause and reaffirm God's plans for St Mary's. The Building Committee plan to provide a suggested building staging and cost estimates for consideration. We are hoping our staging will minimise disruption to our parish operations, administration, pastoral offices and hall usage.

Gavin has spoken with several of the wardens regarding a prayer vigil to be led by Parish Council members and open to all parishioners. Please look out for this in future Parish correspondence.

Please continue to uphold the building works in your prayers.
